It was designed to support not only the Cisco Networking Academy program, but also its infrastructure and business policies for many years to come. The Academy Connection was designed to address many of the pain points heard from our Academy Community and also from our senior management team. In addition to simply building a website, the design team had to think about how we were going to migrate from our simple one-application, one-vendor, one-tier support team to a multi-application, multi-vendor, multi-tiered support model. January and February of 2003 were especially difficult because of so many unexpected events converging at once. Everyone had prepared as much as humanly possible and the green light was given by all parties to launch the site. In hindsight, our execution strategy needed more special attention. The events experienced during January and February really tested our support model and we are now in the progress of making adjustments as needed.

Secondly, we are working to deliver solutions in a timely fashion while communicating our plans in advance. And third, we are evaluating additional training needs and improving the support model. Many lessons have been learned and I know that the entire Cisco Worldwide Education team is dedicated to rebuilding the relationships we had in December – whatever it takes.

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DID YOU KNOW...?

Bell Canada Utilizes Cisco Systems Technology to Help Deliver Surgical Grade Network to Power Historic Telerobotics Assisted Surgery.

HAMILTON, Canada - March 4, 2003 - A three-armed robot directly translates a surgeon's natural hand, wrist and finger movements, allowing the surgeon to operate on a patient hundreds of miles away. This may sound like science fiction, but it's now reality following the completion of the world's first hospital-to-hospital telerobotics assisted surgery.

On February 28, 2003, Dr. Mehran Anvari, an internationally recognized specialist in minimal access surgery, performed the world's first hospital-to-hospital telerobotics assisted operation from St. Joseph's Healthcare, Hamilton, Ontario to a patient in North Bay, Ontario. Using a specially designed robot operating over Bell Canada's state-of-the-art national IP backbone, Dr. Anvari assisted Dr. Craig McKinley, a North Bay-based surgeon, in performing a laparoscopic Nissen fundoplication (acid-reflux) surgery over a distance of approximately 250 miles.

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Gender Initiative in Mexico

The female population in the universities has experienced a meaningful growth, but it's still lesser than the male population, even though women make up more than half of the population in Mexico.

The courses offered by the Cisco Networking Academy Program, grant women exponential benefits. First, it offers the latest IT knowledge and skills and an industry standard certification, allowing women to be part of the Internet economy. Women acquired a knowledge base, which allows them to help in the IT development of their community or country. On the other hand, women involvement increases the IT labour, helping its own economic development. Finally, Cisco Networking Academy Program offers individual study time and personalized learning, allowing women to overcome time and distance barriers, frequently associated with continuous education.

Aware of the need to take advantage of the opportunities offered to women in the TI and telecommunications area, Cisco and CLI have created several associations with international organizations, academic institutions, governments, and non-profit making organizations, intended for the gender digital division. Two of the participating organizations are AED (Academia para el desarrollo de la Educación; Education Development Academy) and IWITTS (Institute for Women in Trades, Technology & Science; Instituto para las Mujeres en Oficios, Tecnología y Ciencia), both of them working to assure the gender's basic training, through the Cisco Networking Academy Program.

Other countries where the Networking Academy is focused on gender, in cooperation with institutions and NGOs include, Cameroun, Ghana, India, Philippines, Rwanda, Mexico, Togo, Democratic Republic Congo, and South Africa. Besides, Cisco and CLI are working with new academies to train women as instructors and serve as models.

Through projects and associations like these, Cisco and the Cisco Learning Institute are working together to diminish the gender digital division and to assure women get the required knowledge to act as change leaders in the global information era.

On February 11, CATC México attended the annual CATCs meeting in Raleigh, North Carolina. The meeting was in the Research Triangle Park in Cisco Systems' headquarters. Within the countries invited were United States, Dominican Republic, Australia, Canada, London and México.

The event offered administrative sessions for CATCs and other sessions for CCNAs and CCNPs. The Mexican CATC attended the administrative and CCNA sessions.

During the 3 days of the Administrative sessions, several topics were discussed and diverse activities were carried out. One of the success stories presented, was the impact of the program in the different countries, which allowed us to share experiences.

We talked about the importance of the new e-learning model culture and its effect in different cultures; for this topic, México presented the success story of the Valle del Mezquital Technological University (UTVM) and its students, the implementation of the program and how it has speed up the progress of these communities, shortening distances and reducing the digital breach.

The CCNA ver 3.0 track was also offered, and the new topics included are:

- VLSM Lecture
- RIPv2 Lecture
- Network Address Translation Lecture

- Switch CLI
- Inter-VLAN Routing
- VLAN Trunking Protocol
- Link State Routing Protocol
- Single Area OSPF Lecture
- EIGRP Lecture

All these subjects were discussed, and we expect to be able to design such a comprehensive agenda that allows us to replicate at least part of these sessions to the Regional Academies in México. We might do it during the Retooling, in May 29 and 30 in the CATC facilities inside the Tamaulipas Autonomous University in Ciudad Victoria. During this event, the Academies in México will be able to get detailed and customized information relating the curriculum changes, ACT, new training strategies and other important topics reviewed at the CATCs' event. We want to share this information with the Academies to finish the communication cycle and to match the Cisco Networking Academy Program changes and updates worldwide.
